What's New at the Museum! By Alison Matsen

Professional artist John B. Moll, Jr. was born in Pennsylvania and died in Maryland, but he married a Middletown girl, Barbara Pool, and lived just north of the Academy (our museum) in the 1930's and 1940's. At that time he did this beautiful and rare watercolor of an everyday scene in an historically African-American neighborhood in Middletown, Delaware.

This beautiful watercolor, 14" x 15", by John B. Moll, Jr. is the fourth work by him in our collection, and only the second original work. The other two are woodcuts. We had a new mat put on the picture to pick up the blues in the painting.

Participating in Community Traditions By Alison Matsen

For the first time ever, the Middletown Historical Society will be participating in Historic Odessa Foundation's holiday activities. In the Wilson house (1769) we, along with many other groups, will decorate a tree based on a children's book.

The book we chose is Elizabeth Enright's 1942 children's book, "The Four-Storey Mistake". It tells of the Melendy children, whose widowed father, concerned about their safety during World War II, moves his four children from New York City to an old Victorian house out in the country. At first the children don't like the old house, but they gradually learn to love it, and create their own fun in it and in the surrounding area. They are intrigued by several mysteries in the house and yard. Mona, the aspiring actress, Rush, who loves to play the piano, Randy, who is determined to be a ballerina, and little Oliver, who just wants to fish and have fun, along with Cuffy, the loveable cook, and Willie, the handyman, form a great group of characters who learn to appreciate life in the Victorian mansion.

Alison Matsen, Linda Biggs, and Linda Harting are the volunteers who will decorate the tree with items that reflect the story and the interests of the characters. We chose this book because it reflects the Society's ongoing concern for the preservation of the remarkable historic architecture in the Middletown area, like Cochran Grange-pictured below.
